WHY ARE NESTING/ROOSTING BOXES NEEDED?

Each year literally thousands of acres of wildlife habitat are being lost or converted to meet our growing need for such things as housing, transportation, and food. Cavity nesting birds have been especially impacted by these habitat changes. With each passing year, it is becoming more difficult for cavity nesting birds to find a place to nest. In fact, in most areas in Georgia, there are simply not enough cavities to go around. We can all help alleviate this housing shortage by erecting one or more nesting boxes on our property.

For additional information regarding the best places to erect boxes and the best bluebird box designs, go to your computer's search engine and type in Out My Backdoor Archive. This will bring up an archive of all of the *Out My Backdoor Columns* that have appeared in the GeorgiaWild enews letter. There you will find two columns that deal with the proper design and location of nesting boxes.
