Flower Show School is Filling Up

There's still time to register for Flower Show School, but space is going fast! The Redbud District along with the Laurel District, Creative Studies Club, The Designers Club and North Georgia Council of Flower Show Judges are holding the first NGC accredited school in Georgia since 2017 beginning on August 21. If you're interested in floral design, how to grow a perfect plant, want to stage a flower show or simply discover what judging is all about, don't miss this opportunity. The brochure and registration form are currently on the Redbud District website.

The four course School teaches all you need to know to judge, enter, compete, and chair an NGC flower show like our own annual Redbud District Show. Each course presents a deep dive on key principles and elements of design, judging criteria for designs and horticulture. You'll get a thorough understanding of flower show procedure. Learn just what makes a blue-ribbon entry.

It's an intensive, highly rewarding experience. The Horticulture curriculum covers more than just how plants grow. You'll discover how to select, groom, and exhibit your plant. You'll write a flower show schedule and critique exhibits.

Design sessions give you a handle on the Principles and Elements of Design. You'll get the tools you need to evaluate various NGC types like creative line, creative mass, cascade, multi-rhythmic, parallel, functional table, exhibition tables and many more types.

For flower show procedure, expect to gain enough knowledge to host your own show and to become an accredited flower show judge. You'll learn how to constructively critique design, horticulture, and educational exhibits.

Classes are taught by certified and nationally known GCG accredited instructors. You'll get advice from the best in the business. All classes will be held at the Marietta Garden Education Center in downtown Marietta. Dates are as follows:

> 2022 – 1st Session: Aug. 21, 22, 23, 24 2023 – 2nd Session: April 23, 24, 25, 26 2023 – 3rd Session: Aug. 27, 28, 29, 30 2024 – 4th Session: Feb. 25, 26, 27, 28

What's Cookin' Daisy on the Front Burner

We're extremely excited to be heating up What's Cookin' Daisy, the 49th Annual Redbud District Flower Show. This year we'll be at a new but familiar venue, Callanwolde Fine Arts center in DeKalb County.

As you may know, this is the location of the DeKalb County Federation of Garden Clubs who've taken a major and much appreciated role in making sure this show gets done. Callanwolde is an utterly unique setting and will provide us with a beautiful backdrop for our horticulture and design exhibits. Many folks are now hard at work planning this event, but, as always, we need volunteers. You'll be seeing emails from various chairs asking for help.

One of the biggest challenges we'll have is time. Due to Callanwolde's calendar of events, we'll be unable to use the weekends for set-up or tear-down. We start set-up September 19, begin accepting exhibits on the 20th, judge on the 21st, open the show to the public on the afternoon of the 21st and all day on the 22nd and we'll tear everything down on the 22nd. So, we need a small army to work hard and fast in all areas. One of the major improvements for the show is that designs and horticulture will be in the same room – the Courtyard. So, when a chair calls for volunteers, sign-up!

Other changes are underway. We are asking you to bring your horticulture in the **usual green bottles**. We've severely cut back on the number of bottles we've stored. Added to that, we have a smaller intake area so it will be vital for your sanity to come prepared! We're also going to be changing how we attach horticulture entry cards. Instead of those pesky rubber bands, we're going to be using **drapery hooks** which will be available at the show. You will bring your specimens with separate entry cards. When you get to the show, bring your entry card, make sure your item is staged properly, and place a drapery hook in the bottle. You can easily slip the card over hook. No more torn or wet cards!

Several of us have begun the Flower Show circuit again and I can't tell you how many times I've been asked about Daisy. Everyone is anxious to see what's next from Redbud. I tell them, of course, it will be "Remarkable" as always.

Secret Gardens of Avondale and Other Successes Add Up for Avondale Estates Garden Club

From their second annual plant sale for Garden Week in Georgia, to another 'Recycling Rodeo,' and then kicking off National Garden Week with the Secret Gardens of Avondale tour, these beautiful busy bees have a lot to show for their hard work!

Since AEGC's inaugural plant sale in April 2021 was a success, plans were immediately made to bring this event back to gardeners far and wide. Over a hundred different plant varieties were on sale, the majority of which came from members' own gardens. Plants were tended for months in a makeshift nursery in the backyard of member and committee co-chair Susan Barton. Garden Week in Georgia around Earth Day each year signals the club to create some flower power (not to be confused with AEGC's award-winning newsletter by the same name) and share their delightful plants with others in the area.



May proved just as busy as the previous month, when members enjoyed a program on creating flower arrangements from items cut from their vards led by a club member, as well as hosting a mini flower show of arrangements from different members that evening. The group was able to keep from the landfill 60 pounds of paint and chemicals, two car loads of various plastics, two televisions, 20 pounds of metal, and more! Not long after that flower show and Recycling Rodeo, first Vice President Patricia Calcagno delivered a poignant, heartfelt address to honor our fallen service members for Memorial Day where AEGC planted flowers this year around their Blue Star Memorial marker.



National Garden Week in June saw the resurgence of the garden tour in Avondale Estates known as the Secret Gardens of Avondale. All too often we drive or walk by beautiful yards and wonder what lies in the parts we cannot see from the street. Secret Gardens of Avondale took that sentiment and ran with it, spearheading the first tour in 2019. After a brief hiatus due to the heights of the pandemic, the tour was revived this year to thunderous review. Smoke Rise Morning Glories Awarded DeKalb Federation School Grounds Improvement Grant

This April 2022 the DeKalb Federation School Grounds Improvement Committee led by Allison Metheny of Dunwoody Garden Club awarded \$250 in grant funds to the Smoke Rise Morning Glories for their new local elementary school STEM program. The proposal submitted by the Morning Glories defined the project plans and noted that donated funds, materials and labor would cover the expenses of the planned project in combination with the requested donation from the Federation.

For many years, the Smoke Rise Morning Glories found ways to support the Smoke Rise Elementary

school. Members planted and maintained plantings on the grounds and in the two atriums. We added benches and native plants and even built a pergola and added water features. When the beautiful new school was completed and opened in August 2021, we waited a bit to let them settle in before offering to help again. Happily, Ms. Cummings, the STEM teacher, contacted member Gloria Cooke and told us she was ready for the garden club to get involved.

A committee was formed in the fall of 2021 to meet with Ms. Cummings at the school and we identified an ideal location to construct raised beds for an outdoor classroom for the students. This area has full sun, access to water and electricity and is easily accessed from the parking lot and is on level ground.

The committee of Kim Fair, Quill Duncan, Melodie Janin and Dolly Moy created a landscape plan to construct four separate raised beds made of pressure treated lumber with concrete corners. Each bed is 18 square feet and easy for children to maintain. The materials for the beds were purchased using grants from the Morning Glories and the DeKalb Federation of Garden Clubs. On May 12th, the committee with help from Reuben Fair, Steve Duncan and Wayne Moy installed the four beds and added gravel in their bases.



When the school year begins in mid-August, we will set a date to add the layers of cardboard, mulch and soil to fill the beds and prepare them for plantings. Ms. Cummings and her students will select the seeds and plants and our team will purchase them with our donated funds. The students will plant, water and maintain the garden and enjoy watching the plants grow and perhaps even sample the harvest. There are plans to add blueberry shrubs and other low-growing flowering shrubs along the perimeter of the space to attract pollinators and add to the beauty and educational aspects of the garden.
