Change proved invigorating as we challenged ourselves with an elegant and fun culinary setting for our 49th Redbud District Flower Show. What a delight to see so many Redbuds participate! Redbud's Designers Club came through with a few members pitching in three designs each and several folks from Creative Studies Club in Marietta pitching in as well. Youth came through again with 20 designs and 23 horticulture entries from kids supported by Conyers Garden Club, Iris Garden Club and Merry Weather Garden Club.

We didn't know what to expect with such a major change; but we were all pleasantly surprised. The location drew kudos from judges and exhibitors alike. Callanwolde and its staff were the best! They were helpful beyond what we'd hoped for. Callanwolde Director Andrew Keenan cut the ribbon on Wednesday afternoon and over 100 visitors attended the show in just 1½ days! Thanks to the chairs, the runners, the hostesses, the table toppers, the placement folks, the entertainment teams, the horticulture experts, the design consultants and everyone who just stopped by and said "Can I help?" We never do this alone so pat yourselves on the back!

While the quality of both designs and horticulture was exceptional, we did have some big winners. The *PLANT AMERICA* Community Project Grants Program is sponsored by National Garden Clubs, Inc. for new or existing club projects in their respective communities. Projects may be a joint venture with another organization/s. The scope of these projects may include but are not limited to:

- □ Beautification and/or restoration
- Community gardens
- Youth gardening

- Landscaping projects
- Implementation of environmental practices
- A horticulture or environmental educational event for the public
- Habitat for Humanity landscaping

Grant Amount: Up to \$1,000.00 is available to be used for direct expenses of 2023 projects.

Who May Apply:

- □ Individual or near-garden clubs that are members of National Garden Clubs, Inc.
- □ NOTE: Recipients of previous PLANT AMERICA Community Project Grants are NOT eligible to apply.

How to Apply using this PDF form:

- Application is limited to a **TOTAL** of **two (2) pages**. (<u>This page does not count.</u>)
 - > **ONE (1) PAGE** Application Form (Page 1)
 - > ONE (1) PAGE Budget (Page 2)
- □ Applications of more than two pages will **NOT** be considered. NO PHOTOS/DIAGRAMS.

Application Deadline: October 15, 2022

Final Report:

- 1. **Deadline:** within two months after the completion of the project or by April 1,2024.
- 2. Email the following:
 - □ A short two-to-three pages report describing the project including photos

 - □ A copy of any publicity

Remember 9/11 Ceremony

The DeKalb County Federation of Garden Clubs, Inc. once again provided a beautiful wreath for the *Remember 9/11* Ceremony held annually at the DeKalb County Public Safety Complex in Tucker. The First Responders unit is very grateful for this generosity, participation and support of them. Beginning in 2014, Federation members have participated on September 11 in a ceremony at this DeKalb County Police and Fire Headquarters. The ceremony honors the memory of the first responders who died tragically in the events that unfolded on 9.11.2001.

This year marked year 21 of this terrible day for our Nation. The Memorial Remembrance Ceremony was held Sunday morning, September 11th at DeKalb County Public Safety Complex at 1960 West Exchange Place, Tucker 30084.

The ceremony always begins at 8:46 am, to commemorate the time the first plane struck the Twin Towers. Glenndolyn Hallman, DeKalb Federation Garden Club President and Susan Turner, *Remember 9/11* Chairman, joined DCFD Chief Alex Lane to place the wreath. Members from all branches of Public Safety participated in this moving ceremony.

Metal from the Twin Towers site was used in creating this memorial sculpture. It is a beautiful tribute to those who gave and lost so much. The public is invited to attend this Patriot Day ceremony.



Garden Therapy Project Update

The DeKalb Federation of Garden Clubs began working on a garden therapy project with Georgia Regional Hospital in 2019. This project has also been supported by Smoke Rise Morning Glories of Tucker and The Garden Club of Georgia. Recently, Bonnie Pennington and Quill Duncan (both members of Smoke Rise Morning Glories) visited the hospital to get an update on the project. They met with Mary Cochran, the Garden Therapy Site Coordinator. Mary assumed the responsibility of the project when Jackie Cox left Georgia Regional. Mary has taken the project and really run with it. She has been able over the last 2+ years to engage several of the Therapy Staff into this garden project and expand on what Jackie had started.

Mary has five patients/residents who are able to assist and spend a large amount of time helping with weeding, planting, and cultivating the large garden and the Community Beds. The other Therapy staff, (Art, Music and Occupational Therapy and Skilled Nursing) are taking parts of the garden project into their units. In many cases they bring their patients out to the large garden and other areas to view and discuss plants, mindfulness and ways of coping in their world. Some of the patients are permanent residents; others can possibly rejoin society by taking prescribed medication and learning coping skills to help them re-enter society (find a job, find a safe place to live, make trustworthy friends, etc.)

Mary uses the Kitchen in the Art & Music Therapy Building to help residents learn how to prepare foods from the garden, another life skill.


The photos that follow show examples of the garden. Keep in mind this is not a UGA showcase garden but a way of introducing gardening and its benefits to part of a population that has difficulty dealing with the sensory world. The plants bring enjoyment and healing to all who are able to be part of the project.

The Hospital Management appears to be quite supportive of this project and some of the medical staff are participating in helping by bringing in plants and explaining how these vegetables are used in other cultures; for example, Korean spinach.
