

Happy New Year Classy Camellias,

I hope everyone had a special Christmas and the New Year is starting off in the right direction.

Two fundraising projects are underway for our District. The first is Flower Show School. At our last board meeting, after much discussion, it was decided we would try to fund a flower show school to be held in Camellia District. We are woefully short of Flower Show Judges, and hope this effort will make it more convenient and, hopefully, more affordable for the people of our area to attend. It was voted on that we would ask each person to make a one-time \$10.00 contribution for this cause. If everyone will contribute, we will have the necessary funding to get this done, without resorting to other types of fundraising. I am asking each club to collect this money from each club member and write one check to Camellia District with a note that it is for the Flower Show School and forward to our District Treasurer. The sooner the funds are raised, the sooner we can begin the process of implementing this school. Thank you in advance for helping our District to be the best we can be.

The other fundraiser is for the State. Each year the State raises its funds with an annual money raffle. Tickets are \$5.00 each or 5 tickets for \$20.00. The drawing will be held at the GCG Convention in Stone Mountain, GA on April 20, 2023. The Grand Prize is \$500.00, Second Prize is \$250.00, and Third Prize is \$125.00. <u>You do not have to be present to win</u>. Again, this is the only time the State asks the clubs for money other than your annual dues. Please try to support this effort as well. Tickets will be coming to each club very soon. Instructions will be included in the letter that will accompany the tickets.

We have an upcoming Board Meeting in Dublin, GA on February 10, 2023. The call letter and information will be coming out very shortly. I encourage all chairmen and district officers to please attend. This will be my last Board Meeting as your District Director and I would love to see each of you there.

Our Nominating Committee has been busy preparing the slate of officers for 2023-2025. This slate will be presented at the upcoming Board Meeting. Our new officers will be installed in Stone Mountain at the GCG Convention in April.

Increasing Membership

What Does it Mean?

All of us constantly interact with friends, neighbors, and co-workers on a daily basis who are not members of a garden club. What a wonderful opportunity to talk up "Garden Club". What we say to them, how we say it, the impression we give of our club in conversations all go a long way toward getting that particular person to think about joining. Keep in mind that we're responsible for getting new members to join our individual garden clubs. In the eyes of the community, we are **The Garden Club of Georgia**, **Inc.** and membership means **YOU** and **ME**!

How To Get New Members To Join Your Club?

Easy, just ask!

Here are just a few ideas that you many want to try:

- 1. Ask your neighbor, Sunday School member, or Bridge Club to visit a club meeting.
- 2. Have club members send invitations to new residents in their neighborhood.
- 3. Have a Plant Party or Plant Exchange ~ invite the public. Hand out invitations to the club meeting.
- 4. Print up a flyer on how nice a yard looks and place it on the front door of the home inviting the owner to the next garden club meeting.
- 5. Start conversations about gardening when in supermarkets and/or garden nursery lines if they are purchasing plants or flowers.
- 6. Have a *Membership Table* with a sign-up book and club membership information at your garden club's flower show, fund-raisers, and community fairs and events.
- 7. When someone shows interest, follow up by contacting them and sending them a notice of meetings.
- 8. And the most important one of all: MAKE THEM FEEL WANTED AS A MEMBER!

Have you ever been invited to a club or some type of gathering and no one ever came by and welcomed you? This is a very good way **NOT** to get a new member. A prospective member attending a garden club meeting, should walk away feeling like they are already a part of the garden club. Introduce the prospective member to others during the club's hospitality time. If time permits during the meeting, have the new member tell a little something about themselves, hobbies, and family. Then after the meeting, let them ask questions about the club. Once they joined make them a part of the club. A good "ice-breaking" activity for the new member is to be a *Greeter* at the club meetings. This presents an excellent opportunity to get to know each other. Also, invite the new member to a club function that has high visibility and interaction with other members. This includes social functions, service activities and state/district meetings.

New Member Packets and/or New Member Orientation Sessions

An informed member is an involved member. Once that prospective member joins, we seem to forget to "introduce" them to the joys of being an active garden club member. Periodically throughout the year, invite new members to a gathering to get to know more about the club. This could be a "Dessert Party" at a member's home. Helpful information on the club's history, projects, ideals and mission are all good introductions to your club. If scheduling a New Member Orientation is not possible, then produce a *New Member Packet*. Put your club's by-laws, yearbooks, and any other information that will inform the new member about not only your garden club's activities and projects, but something about the district, state, regional and national's activities and projects. A new member who has been introduced to the garden club's activities and projects and remain active.

Garden clubs provide education, resources, and national networking opportunities for its members to promote the love of gardening, floral designs, civic and environmental opportunities. 10 Tasks to Keep Your Garden Growing this Winter

Winter is certainly the time to dream, plan and prepare for next year's garden, but there are a number of tasks you can do out in the garden to keep it growing well through the winter months. Take a look at ten ways to maintain your green thumb through the coldest time of year.

- 1. Dream, scheme and plan for next season.
- 2. Pre-order seeds, bulbs and plants for spring.
- 3. Design a new garden bed, path or feature.
- 4. Organize your shed or garage.
- 5. Sharpen and oil your tools.
- 6. Check stored bulbs and tubers for mold and moisture.
- 7. Water any containerized plants you are overwintering.
- 8. Reapply mulch or lay evergreen boughs over sensitive plants in the garden.
- 9. Reapply animal repellents, if necessary.
- 10. Maintain water features and bird baths.
