


Bring your pull tabs to the October Meeting!

HOW TO: Tabs should be clean and in sealed plastic bags or spill proof containers with the club's name and city on a slip of paper inside each bag. Please be sure to include the city since we have several clubs with the same name in our district. You do need to add club number. Also, please put <u>MAGNOLIA DISTRICT IN WITH THE NAME, CITY AND NUMBER OF CLUB</u>. You and Magnolia District will gain credit for the tabs. Tabs may be brought to district board meetings or to the pull tab chairman's home. She weighs the tabs, takes them to the Ronald McDonald House, and keeps an ongoing tally of the weight of tabs donated by each club and the date tabs are received. Large amounts of tabs may be weighed by the club and recorded on the container. One other option is to take the tabs to a local recycling center, have them weighed, receive money for the tabs and donate the money. Metal tabs from beverage cans, pet food, and canned goods are accepted. Bags of tabs are often handled several times, so please be sure each bag is labeled and secure. Magnolia District, pull those tabs!

The Club collected enough money to have the sign built, installed and maintained. It was a simple wood sign painted black with gold letters "Winchester 1961" on one side and "Winchester Garden Club" on the other. She was a beauty. She welcomed the neighbors and club members home every day. She is nothing like the grand entrances of today with elaborate manufactured sign and stone entrances. But did her job with honor. The necessary: She stood strong, for these past 61 years but she was tired and weathered and in need of a face lift. Fast forward to May

2022. The Winchester Garden Club voted to this refresh beauty. Cleaning supplies, paint, brushes, clippers and pine straw were brought to her feet and the work began. With many of the Winchester Club helping Members it didn't take long to bring her back to the beauty


- a. Conformance to length (5)

Length of Essay: Between 600-700 words. The entry will be penalized if it does not conform to the required length. All words are to be counted. All entries must be typed and titled.

Only regional winners are considered in the judging for national winners. Contest winners will not be allowed to win two consecutive years. All of the winning entries will be compiled into a booklet, which will be made available to the winners.

Eligibility: Kindergarten through Ninth Grade

- Special Education
- English as a second language
- General Education

Dates for Submission:

• Club entries must be sent to Magnolia District Poetry Chairman Bobbie Liggett by **December 1**.

Guidelines:

- Poems should be no longer than 24 lines (including title) with a maximum 42 letters/spaces per line-in order to fit on a single page of the booklet.
- All entries must be typed and titled on an 8.5 x 11-inch paper.
- Include name, address, age, grade, and school of participant on the back of entry using the labels at: <u>http://gardenclub.uga.edu/pdfs/contestlabels.pdf</u>
- Sponsoring garden club and state garden club name must also be identified. The club contact person is the mailing address for any winning entries.
- Sponsoring garden club may be that of a grandparent.
- All entries become the property of National Garden Clubs, Inc. and will not be returned. Make your own copies.
- Poems do not have to rhyme.
- Poems may be traditional verse, acrostics, blank verse, cinquains, diamond poems, limerick, or Haiku.
- The theme should not be used as the title to any poem. Be creative and include at least one of the following words from the theme: Seeds, Trees, Bees, Nature. When judging, the title is worth 10 points.

Scale of Points: Title: 10% + Content: 40% + Creativity: 30% + Style: 20% = Total: 100%

A State Certificate may be awarded to first place winners in each grade level within each category for the best poem submitted by an individual youth sponsored by a GCG member club. Cash awards will be \$25(1st place), \$15(2nd place) and \$10 (3rd place) in each of the 30 divisions.

Has balcony gardening come into its own yet? Maybe - as a part of the green revolution of cityscapes. But if you still don't think so, are there things we can do to speed the process? Well, engaging in the time-honored practice of planting native blooming plants that attract native pollinators can certainly be "one of those things!"

Balconies come in different lengths and widths, with all manner of sun exposures. Common to most is that they are usually well off the ground and outside. Bees and butterflies will fly upwards of 150 feet high in search of provisions. Flies and some wasps will too, and they can help pollinate. Think also about purchasing native butterfly chrysalids to populate your garden. So even if your balcony protrudes from the 10th floor, the opportunity is yours to provide a pollinator waystation!
