

Plant Native: Horticulture

Passion Vine (Maypop) - Recipes | Walter Reeves: The Georgia Gardener

Horticulture: Plant Profile — Wild Passion Flower, "Maypop" (Passiflora incarnata) One of the showiest native vines, Maypop is a must for the butterfly garden. It is the host plant for the Gulf Fritillary butterfly and can be a host for Zebra Longwings, although they prefer Corky Stem Passionvine. I love the pod, flower, and vine returning year after year. The perennial flowerine vine is native to Georgia and can be grown easily. The gorgeous, three- to five-inch flowers come in shades of lavender or purple, with a wavy fringe over the petals. The middle of the bloom looks like a helipad, with a tiny bean-like pollen sac suspended overhead. Each flower lasts about a day during the summer and early fall. The ovoid, greenish yellow fruit, **is edible** and tastes like a tart combination of lemon and lime. They can be juiced as well. Native Americans made a tea with the dried leaves to treat insomnia. There are at least five other native species of Passiflorain the U. S.: lutea, multiflora, pallens, sexflora, and suberosa, but the passion flower (P. incarnata) is by far the showiest. In most cases, the native species of

passionflower are preferable over introduced species. The Passiflora foetida is invasive and does spread J Source:

I purchased plants in Plains and in Valdosta at Native Plant meetings. Each year they come back but the caterpillars devour it. I transplanted a passion vine from a field several years ago. I really enjoy the vines climbing on my fence, giving me stunning flowers, plus many butterflies, cocoons, and caterpillars! Every reference says the fruits are edible, but I had to search for recipes! Check google for passionflower recipes!

Thai basil called káuchàn-thah in Taiwan, is a type of basil native to Southeast Asia that has been cultivated to provide distinctive traits. Widely used throughout Southeast

Blue Star Marker

On Friday, July 22nd, a Blue Star Marker will be installed at the Veterans Administration Clinic (corner of River and Mobley Road) Columbus, Georgia. It is sponsored by the <u>Green Island Garden Club of the Magnolia District.</u>

The Blue Star Memorial Marker Program is a National Garden Club and Garden Club of Georgia program that honors all men and women who serve in the United States Armed Services. The program began with the planting of 8,000 dogwood trees by the New Jersey Council of Garden Clubs in 1944 as a living memorial to veterans of World War II. In 1945, the National Garden Clubs adopted the program and began a Blue Star Highway system that covers thousands of miles across the Continental United States, Alaska and Hawaii. A large metal Blue Star Memorial Highway Marker was placed at appropriate locations along the way.

The program has been expanded to include all men and women who have served, are serving or will serve in the Armed Services of the United States. Memorial Markers and By-Way markers have been added along with the Highway Markers, to be placed in National Cemeteries, Veterans' and Military facilities and other civic locations.

This program has been active all through the years to the present, a fitting tribute to our Armed Forces and especially now. Since the program's inception in 1944, garden clubs have dedicated about 3,000 markers throughout the United States, with Georgia having about 160 markers throughout the state. The Magnolia District has 25 plus markers in the district.
