Laurel District Fall Meeting was hosted by the Magnolia Garden Club of Cartersville. There were 106 attendees to this fabulous meeting. Our new Executive Board was elected at this meeting with Cheryl Briscoe nominated as the incoming Laurel District Director for 2023-2025.

Our District Board, hosted by Hoe'n In Euharlee Garden Club, met in Euharlee on February 16, 2023. A place was set in memory of Susan Stephens. Board members wrote cards of remembrance sharing a happy memory which were delivered to her family along with a vase of colorful flowers by our Laurel District Chaplain Mickey Carlton. Please send a list of your garden club's deceased members since the GCG Convention last April to Chaplain Mickey Carlton as well as to State Chaplain Diane Harbin, so they can be recognized at the State Convention Memorial service.

Laurel District has an overall increase in its membership of 20 members for 2022. We have a total of 58 clubs which includes – 5 disbanded clubs, one club that merged with another, two new clubs, and one reinstated club. There are a total of 1517 members including 17 Subscribing members at the end of 2022.

This director has received 38 President's reports which is a participation rate of 66%. Thirteen of these clubs will receive a Standard of Excellence for their work in 2022. Reading of all the various activities of the Laurels of Light has been inspiring. I am in the process of collating all of the information in these wonderful reports. Our clubs have been busy with holiday decorations, "Family Fun Days", youth activities, special projects, and more.

GCG Raffle ticket sales are ongoing with many clubs not reporting yet. To date 186 tickets have been sold. A reminder to purchase these tickets will be sent in the next week to all Laurel District Club Presidents. Laurel District needs to sell a minimum of 350 tickets to qualify for \$250 from the state.

Laurels of Light have many upcoming special events including plant sales, Pond and Garden Tour sponsored by Magnolia Garden Club on May 20, and Soque Garden Club's Garden Extravaganza on May 6.

This director is looking forward to the Annual Convention and the Awards Banquet when we celebrate the many achievements of our garden clubs.

A horticulture tip on how winter cold affects Georgia crops and landscape plants was given by Fran Cathey. Information was obtained from the CAES Newswire from the University of Georgia. According to the article, some crops need a certain amount of chilling hours to break dormancy.

On the home landscape many of our plants are showing signs of cold damage. We are finding that some of our perennials are not proving to be hardy during the extreme cold temperatures.

A business meeting was conducted by President Linda Allred detailing plans and programs for the upcoming year. The yearbook that is prepared by Treasurer, Anita Poole was updated with new programs and information on the members. "Plant America - Nurture the Garden Thru Beautification, Socialization and Education" was decided on for the theme for the new year.

Monthly speakers, horticulture tips, chairmen, and hostesses for each month were selected. It looks like it going to be an exciting year for the garden club.

Ball Ground Garden Club

Creating a Blue Bird Paradise: Lloyd Shares Expertise



Mike Lloyd, the newest Ball Ground Garden Club member, presented “Creating a Bluebird Paradise” at the February meeting. Bluebirds are known as the harbingers of happiness. Interestingly, their feathers are not pigmented blue, but their color is created by the diffraction of light striking their feathers. They eat crawling insects - great organic pest control in your garden. They mate for life – the male selects their territory; the female builds the nest and after the babies are born both parents feed them. Each year a pair of bluebirds raises 3 clutches of babies.

The Eastern Bluebird in Georgia is a small thrush and remains in Georgia year-round. Their preferred habitats are open woodlands with little understory and open grassland. They like high lookout points, like tree branches, to perch on where they can spot a bug from 60 feet away! In the summer they eat insects; in the winter, when insects are not available, they switch to berries (they are not particularly fond of sunflower seeds).

The Cherokee County Bluebird Trail system was started in 2019 as a UGA Extension project with 10 bluebird boxes in Heritage Park and 8 in Etowah River Park; both parks are in Canton and both are ideal bluebird habitat. In 2021 the trail was expanded by 8 more nest boxes placed on the Reinhardt University campus in Waleska. In 2022, 3 bluebird boxes were placed in Ball Ground parks and 12 in Veterans Park. In 2023, 1 nest box was placed in Brown Park in Canton, 2 more in Ball Ground, 3 on the Cherokee High School campus, and 7 on the CORE Community School farm and campus in Woodstock. Most of these nest boxes will be monitored during the breeding season. Mike has taken a lead role in expanding the bluebird trails and trains anyone interested in monitoring these nest boxes. These boxes not only help to increase our bluebird population, but they serve as valuable educational tools for our citizens, especially our youth, to better understand nature around us. Mike is working on placing bluebird nest boxes in more schools and parks next year.

Andrews Presents Going Native with Azaleas of North GA

Charles Andrews presented the Ball Ground Garden Club January program on Native Azaleas. He is a member of the American Rhododendron Society and the Azalea Society of America. He is currently serving as president of the Azalea Chapter, ARS. He spends much time looking for and photographing these plants in the wild and has hundreds of native azaleas in his Forsyth County, GA garden. Charles will be a speaker at the Ball Ground Plant Sale & Festival on May 13, 2023 at the Botanical Garden in Ball Ground near City Hall.

First things first. Azaleas are part of the rhododendron/blueberry family. Their growing requirements include acid soil, organic matter, continuous moisture, oxygen and sunlight. Their roots will extend 12 feet from the plant but only go 6 inches deep. Therefore the saying “Don’t put a \$20 plant in a 12-cent hole.” Dig a hula-hoop sized hole, add some pine bark nuggets and micronutrients. The native plants like to be started in a raised bed for a year before being transplanted. There are at least 12 species of native azaleas found in Georgia. Native azaleas are deciduous while most Asian azaleas in our yards are not. Azaleas are Georgia’s official state wildflower.

In northern Georgia the most common species of native azaleas is the *Rhododendron calendulaceum*, or the Flame Azalea. It gets up to 15 feet tall. This is the yellow-orange-reddish azalea found in the mountains of north Georgia. Its flower is open with a flat face, there is no smell and it is a tetraploid (2x chromosomes). There are 17 species of azaleas in America, only 4 species are tetraploids the others are all diploid. So that makes the Flame Azalea special.

Another common azalea in north Georgia is the Plum leaf (*R. prunifolium*) azalea. This is found in the watersheds of the Chattahoochee River and made Callaway Gardens (central west Georgia) famous. It is a late blooming azalea.

MARSHALL FOREST REPORT

Land Trust Marshall Forest

Marshall Forest has been the scene of much activity this fall and winter. The parking lot is full most nice days as many are using the trails as a means of getting out in nature and away from the crowds with Covid still an issue.

- The Nature Conservancy Fire Crew will be reinstalling the Braille signs that have fallen off the stands using longer bolts, lock washers and nuts.
- Tours of the forest were given in October with over 50 participants.
- A Garden club member's son replaced the remaining guide rope posts as his Eagle Scout project. Pressure treated lumber was used for the posts as the composite posts are on backorder for 26 months or more due to supply chain issues.
- Some of the guide ropes have been replaced, but more rope has been requested from the climbing gym in Kennesaw.
- Several clubs have scheduled tours of the Forest during the spring.
- The Robert Weed Memorial Walk was held in October.
- PDF files were sent to Emma Wells of the city of Rome to create the QR codes for the trail maps and other Forest information. Katie Owens from the Nature Conservancy will have them posted in the Kiosk at the beginning of the Braille and Dorsey Trails.
- This chairman met with the new Trails Coordinator Julien Smith and the Project manager Mary Hardin Thornton for the City of Rome to discuss options for grants that will help improve the Big Pine Braille Trail.
- A program on the Marshall Forest was given on March first to Three Rivers garden Club as the trail has been washed out due to the winter rains.

Marshall Forest still has many things that need to be done to keep the trail well maintained and accessible to the physically impaired.

- The Fire Crew is scheduled to replace rotten boards on the wet weather creek bridge next year.
- Installation of the remaining guide ropes with climbing rope donated by a climbing gym in Kennesaw.
- Redesigning the water flow to prevent the washing out of the gravel on the trail. An Hydrologist will need to be consulted.
- Installation of crusher run gravel along the Braille Trail to provide more accessibility to the physically impaired.

MARSHALL FOREST REPORT 2

The Nature Conservancy is working on a partnership with Berry College and Shorter University to create learning centers in the Pecan field and over to the Coosa River. The goal is to make the Marshall Forest a destination for student field trips. In addition, TNC is working to establish

a working relationship with the City of Rome and TRED to apply for a GOSA grant to upgrade the trails and make other improvements close to the river.

This chairman contacted Katie Owens, Lisa Smith, Mary Hardin Thornton, Ansley Saville, and Julie Smith to set up a planning meeting for the grant.

A list of the donors to Marshall Forest will be listed by District in Board Briefs and Garden Gateways after the Convention. Deed of Gratitude Certificates will be printed for those contributing \$25 before March 1st and will be given to the District Directors at the State Convention in April. Your contributions are important to the Forest as there is no endowment for this property. The improvements made to the forest come from your donations. Your contributions help us keep the Marshall Forest in good condition for visitors. Please don't forget to add Marshall Forest to your club's list of contributions.
