### Gardening for Wildlife: Ball Ground Partnership Sees Great Results

The Ball Ground (Anetsa-Ga-Da) Garden Club has partnered with the local elementary STEM academy to foster the love and support of pollinators. The club has developed a pollinator garden at the school, held pollinator information sessions at the library, supported the local pollinator census at the botanical garden, and has taught the students how to identify monarch butterfly eggs on plants at the garden.

From the STEM academy: "While we were out recharging and enjoying time with our families this summer, one of the STEM academy's partners were rolling up their sleeves and creating a beautiful pollinator garden for our students. The garden, which was fully funded and created by the **Ball Ground Garden Club consists of** colorful lantanas, which are a must have for a pollinator heaven. These plants attract butterflies, bees and hummingbirds with their sweet nectar, attractive scent, bright color and flower form. The pollinator garden will provide an instrumental role in providing the students an avenue to investigate, explore and observe the importance of pollinators in gardening and conservation in the STEM enrichment laboratory."

## Jonquils Sparkle with December Events: Shirley Demos How to Create Outdoor Holiday Designs

Jonquil Garden Club of Smyrna was treated to a fascinating, in depth demonstration by Shirley Priest, our own former JGC president and current Laurel Letters editor, on how to create outdoor holiday arrangements. Shirley detailed and demonstrated how to create three different container designs using a variety of greenery from her own garden as well as accents such as birch branches, dried lotus seed pods, and a bit of faux material.

We were able to see how she created the foundation for her designs by placing water containers of the right size to fill the inside of the decorative pots, for the greenery to sit in.

There are many types of conifer or broadleaf evergreen foliage available to us in our own landscapes—these make up the basis of a winter container design. Shirley shared with us the helpful technique of tying together small bundles of mixed greens with floral wire or rubber bands, making it easier to arrange the foliage masses in the pots and try them in different configurations to get the best effect.

Red holly, nandina or juniper berries add a beautiful color accent but may unobtainable, so we can avail ourselves of the variety of faux berries and dried naturals available at craft stores, or "think outside the box" and scout our gardens for interesting sticks, dried seed pods, etc. to add to designs.





At the end of the program Shirley let us choose from some of many stems of greenery and faux floral stems that she had brought. We all left the meeting excited to get home with some new treasures, new confidence and fresh inspiration for our own designs!

Garden therapy for older adults in assisted living environments can involve engaging older adults in various gardening activities, such as planting, nurturing, and harvesting plants and flowers. This form of therapy has been found to have numerous physical, emotional, and cognitive skill improvement benefits for seniors.

Loneliness can be an impact on residents in assisted living facilities who may not have families nearby. Having a monthly garden club program can be especially beneficial to bring those residents out of isolation to build friendships, provide moderate supervised exercise, and improve attitudes. Research suggests gardening may help reduce stress of aging, improve senses such as smell and touch and decrease anger and sadness. Being a part of a group and connecting with nature can be a beautiful thing!
