

Blue Star Markers and Gold Star Family Markers

The Blue Star Memorial (BSM) Program honors service men and women who have served, are serving or will be serving in the armed services of the United States. Memorial Markers and By-Way Markers are placed at locations such as national cemeteries, parks, veteran's facilities and gardens. The Blue Star Memorial Marker Program was established in 1944 at the end of World War II and honors all who serve in the US Armed Forces; past, present, and future.

In 2015, the Gold Star Families Marker was incorporated into the National Garden Clubs Blue Star Memorial Marker Program. The Gold Star Families Marker honors the families of U.S. Armed Forces members who died in battle or in support of certain military activities.

The Garden Club of Georgia, Inc. has been very supportive of this program. They are offering a grant to seven districts and member clubs/councils for the restoration of Blue Star Markers. GARDEN TIPS AND TRICKS:

Clematis is a beautiful addition to any garden, and with these simple steps, you can grow and care for it easily:

Propagation Methods:

- 1. Take 4-6 inch cuttings from new growth in late spring or early summer. Remove lower leaves, dip in rooting hormone, and plant in well-draining soil.
- 2. Bend a low-growing stem to the ground, wound it slightly, and bury it in soil. Once roots develop, transplant the new plant.
- 3. Divide established plants in early spring or fall, ensuring each division has healthy roots and shoots.

Growing Conditions:

- 1. Provide at least 6 hours of sunlight daily for optimal blooming.
- 2. Plant in well-draining, fertile soil with compost or organic matter.
- 3. Install sturdy supports for climbing.
- 4. Keep soil consistently moist, avoiding water logging.
- 5. Apply mulch around the base to retain moisture and regulate temperature.

Caring for Clematis:

- 1. Prune according to the Clematis group.
- 2. Feed with balanced fertilizer in early spring and after the first bloom.
- 3. Monitor for pests and diseases, treating promptly.
- 4. Provide winter protection with mulch and burlap wrapping if needed.

With these tips, you can enjoy the beauty of Clematis in your garden year after year!

Making Color Palettes: Article By: Linda Doiron

You can learn a lot from flowers. Finding your favorite color palette for a floral arrangement may be as easy as taking a walk and observing what you see. Nature works in extraordinary ways, especially when you consider its hues (colors), tints (lighter color variations) and shades (darker color variations). One way to create your own floral palette is to take pictures from nature and add them to a separate folder that you can return to for inspiration. Don't miss the humble and small aspects of a flower's colors including variations of petals, sepals, stamens, pistils, leaves, stems and subtle hints of new (and old) growth. Floral design experts agree that blending shades and tints of chosen colors is a key to success, so blend, blend, blend. If you like to read, one of my favorite books for inspiration is Taylor Darroch Putnam and Michael Putnam & #39 Flower Color Theory, a complete guide featuring nearly200 arrangements using color theory as the starting point for floral design. If one truly loves nature one finds beauty everywhere". - Vincent Van Gogh

Contemporary Floral Arrangements Utilizing Reeds

The Brookwood Hills Garden Club recently hosted a unique floral design workshop presented by Kathy Powell of Atlanta. Ms. Powell has exhibited in the Philadelphia Flower Show every year since 2000 and has won numerous awards across the country. Kathy co-chaired the floral design division of the 2024 Atlanta Botanical Garden Flower Show. She is also a Sogetsu teacher. Sogetsu is one of the many schools of Ikebana, the art of Japanese flower arrangement with formal display according to various rules.

The Brookwood Hills Garden Club was introduced to some concepts of this floral art as we created contemporary centerpieces utilizing reeds. During this workshop, the reed (which was obtained from China) was soaked in water for about twenty minutes and then each student weaved/manipulated the reed into an artistic structure which served as the vessel or vase. Next, our participants thoughtfully placed beautiful, tropical Anthurium (from Hawaii) into water tubes and then positioned the five flowers into the reed structure. In typical Ikebana style, the flowers were often grouped together to one side (as a harmonious family) leaving important negative space in the structure.

Lastly, the green Aspidistra leaves (Cast Iron leaves) were folded into expressive

designs and carefully placed near the red, pink, or white Anthuriums.

Each member departed the meeting with an individually crafted, statement centerpiece large enough to grace a dining room table. It should be noted that the vessel structure can be re-used in the future with the simple addition of new flowers!






I did it!!!






