Magnolia District Annual Board Meeting Minutes:

MINUTES: Magnolia District Annual Meeting, 10.23.2024

The Magnolia District Annual Meeting, held at the Doublegate Country Club and hosted by the Albany Garden Club was called to order by Director Kay Hagler at 10 AM with a brief welcome. The inspiration was given by Chaplain Carolyn Culpepper and was followed with a song "For The Beauty of the Earth" by Carolyn and her mother, Bess Hartley. The Pledge of Allegiance was led by Eileen Najjar. Director Hagler read the Credentials Report, declared a quorum for the meeting, and gave the definition of who was qualified to vote. Joyce Bridges-Judkins, Albany Garden Club President, welcomed the attendees and the members of the hosting Albany Garden Club were introduced.

Garden Club of Georgia President, Lisa Hall, reminded members of the Deep South Convention which will be held in Valdosta March 11-13, 2025, and the GCG Convention which will be held in Augusta on April 29-30, 2025. She reviewed accomplishments of GCG including Membership 365, financial software, improved Garden Gateways, revised Bylaws, \$85,000 in college scholarships, GCG schools and many shared projects. Clubs with anniversaries of 75 years or more were presented with certificates. These clubs were Dogwood, Azaela, Camellia, Butler, Oglethorpe, Ft. Gaines, and Tea Olive.

Kay Hagler introduced the Head Table, Honor tables and special guests. Meeting appointments were Timekeeper, Bobbie Liggett; Tellers- Marilyn Aldrich, Mary Ann Parks, and Terry Morgan; Approval of

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Minutes – Kathy Hicks and Willie Maxwell. Ann Howell, Recording Secretary, reported that the minutes of the August Board Meeting were approved. Mary Ann Parks, Corresponding Secretary, reported on notes that were sent. Director Kay Hagler read a statement that the June 2023 – May 2024 Financial report had been sent to Gerri Shaw, GCG Treasurer, and had received approval.

Director Kay Hagler reviewed the activity of Magnolia District including memorials for Rosalynn Carter, Blue Star restorations, Gold Star marker dedication, bluebird nesting box restoration in Columbus, scholarships to students at Georgia Southwestern University, the Flower Fantasy at Pineola Farms and several Youth winners at the GCG, Deep South and National Garden Club levels.

Co-Director Marilyn Aldrich reported that membership included 495 registered and 20 Subscribing members. Clubs were asked to register new members with GCG so that new members will be counted and can receive the Garden Gateways, Magnolia Messenger, and other communications. Clubs were encouraged to keep records of when a member joined and acknowledge years of loyalty and pay GCG dues for Honorary members. Suggestions to enlist at least one subscribing member for each club and to help organize new clubs will help GCG to Recruit, Retain and Revitalize.

New business: A motion from Claire Jenkins and the Historic Landscape Preservation Committee that “Magnolia District contribute \$100 annually to the GCG Historic Landscape Preservation program” was passed. Marilyn Aldrich and the Nominating Committee (Sandra Haga, Janice Mohr, and Kay Lambert) presented the list of district officers for 2025-2027: Director- Marilyn Aldrich, Co-Director- Ann Howell, Treasurer -Janis Webb and Recording Secretary- Drenda Sternenberg. The list of officers for 2025-2027 was approved by vote.

Cheryl Briscoe thanked Magnolia District for the yearly contribution to HLP and announced that the Historic Landscape Preservation Fundraiser for 2024 will be held in Marietta on November 2. Janice Cliett read a list of changes for the 2024 GCG Awards Submissions including new November 15 deadlines for some awards, the extension of grades 9-12 for Youth poetry and improvement in the delivery of monetary awards to youth winners. Jane Edmunds issued an invitation to the April 29-30, 2025, GCG Convention in Augusta .

GCG President Lisa Hall presented several awards including Standard of Excellence certificates to twelve clubs, the Sumter Federation and Columbus Council. Willie Maxwell accepted the NGC award for the 2023 Magnolia/ Camellia Flower Show. Jean O’Shields and Kay Hagler presented Magnolia District awards. Camellia Garden Club in Cuthbert and Village Green Garden Club in Byron tied for the Club of the Year award. Rainbow Garden Club in Ellaville received the Ronald McDonald Pull Tab award and Dogwood Garden Club of Americus received the Attendance award for the Annual District Meeting.

Marilyn Aldrich presented certificates for members who had served for 25+ years and 50+ years. Faye Fraizer announced that a Basic Design course will be scheduled in Americus in the spring or summer of 2025. Door prizes were awarded, and the Lunch Blessing was presented by Chaplain Carolyn Culpepper.

Derrell Humphries of Leesburg designed a table centerpiece and a large wreath which were given as door prizes. Following the awards of the Raffle items the meeting was dismissed.

Magnolia Club News The Early Bloomers Garden Club



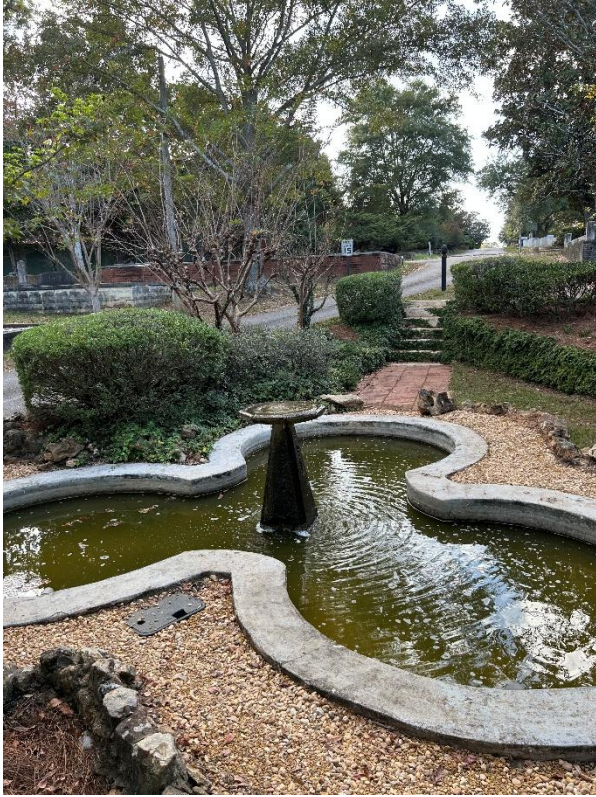
The Early Bloomers Garden Club received a grant from the “Community on My Mind Fund” to help clean up and revitalize the Trinity Pool and Garden at Oak Grove Cemetery in Americus, Ga. Established around 1859, Oak Grove is one of the oldest active cemeteries in the state of Georgia and has been listed on the National Register of Historic Places since September 1979.

The Trinity Pool and Garden is located prominently within the oldest section of Oak Grove Cemetery and was established around 1880.

This small garden area is surrounded by rock walls covered in fig ivy, with a pool/fountain as its focal point. The pool is unique and similar in shape to the trinity knot or Irish knot and has a fountain in the center. The garden



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had become neglected and was desperately in need of “a good cleanup” to remove weeds, dead bushes, and trees. Many of the large rocks surrounding the pool were missing or had been moved about haphazardly. The benches, steps and edges of the pool needed power washing to clean them up. With help from the grant funds, we were able to begin the major cleanup of the garden and fountain. Once the power washing, dead tree limbs and bushes were removed, members took over to restore the garden to a glorious and serene place. We discovered that the area around the fountain had previously had gravel around it. Members sprayed and worked to remove the grass and weeds that had overgrown that area.

On October 6th, we had a workday, and members trimmed the fig ivy on the steps and rock walls. We weeded the area,

raked up dead leaves and grass, and trimmed bushes and tree limbs. Then we put out bales of pine straw around the large oak tree and surrounding beds. We put bags of gravel in the area surrounding the fountain. The next day pentas and asters were planted on the upper ledge of the garden. The transformation of this garden was beautiful and so rewarding.

Americus hosted the Georgia Historic Trust’s Fall Ramble later that week and Oak Grove Cemetery was one of the historic venues for guests to tour. Since the Trinity Pool and Garden is located close to the main entrance of the cemetery; it was viewed by many people as they walked/drove around. Because of the hard work the Early Bloomers put in, the Trinity Pool and Garden is once again a quiet, serene place for visitors to sit and enjoy its beauty.

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Just a Bit of History: The Yule Log! (They come in chocolate, also.)

Historic, decorative, edible, - there is a story behind them all. Burning of the Log: The Celts believed that, for twelve days at the end of December, the sun stood still (which is why the days grew shorter and shorter). If they could keep the Yule logs burning bright for those twelve days, then the sun would be persuaded to move again, and make the days grow longer. If a Yule Log went out, then there would be cursed luck. For Christians, the symbolism of the Yule log was that it represented the need to keep the stable warm for the Infant Christ.

Now, the AI on my computer states, “Oak or ash is what the Yule Log should be unless it is chocolate! Traditionally, the Yule log should be a piece of hardwood, often oak or ash, known for its slow-burning properties and symbolic meanings. Oak represents strength and endurance, while ash is linked to protection and healing.”

PLANT AMERICA Application Procedure Timeline

- Plant America Community Project Grant applications are open to NGC member clubs from **April 1 through October 15** of the calendar year to fund new or continuing projects conducted during the following year.
- Committee member review applications and notify grant recipients in **December**.
- **Funds are released in January or February for projects to be implemented during that year.** Project completion must be within approximately one year, but no later than February 28th of the year after funds are received. Final reports are due by April 1 of that year.
