

On the day you arrive vendors will be set up for you to have a fun shopping experience before gathering for a luncheon to enjoy a delicious meal and hear about the beginning of the Augusta National Golf Club and Trees from our keynote speaker. Next we have two breakout sessions where you will learn more about the birds & the flowers to entertain dinner guests. Immediately following you can tour the Morris Museum of Art where you can enjoy the art displays and also visit the gift shop. You can also travel down to the end of Riverwalk and see the Bonnnie McClain Perennial Garden which is sponsored and maintained by clubs of the Augusta Council. A third option will be to enjoy a Designers' Challenge! That evening we will have district photos, a cash bar, and a fine evening dinner as you have a brief glimpse of some rare spider lilies on the river. Then our world-famous Awards Event will take place. Following the Business Meeting on Wednesday morning we will conclude the convention with our installation luncheon and speaker presenting the photographic beauty of the Okefenokee National Wildlife Refuge.

Tuesday's Keynote speaker at the luncheon is Stan Byrdy, author, journalist & Augusta historian. Byrdy's work has appeared on CNN, ESPN, The Weather Channel, PBS and ABC affiliates nationwide. When he came to Augusta in 1985 as a sports anchor he became involved with the Master's Golf Tournament and in 2005 authored "The Augusta National Golf Club" and he will tell us how The Club came about from Berckman's Nursery. His latest offering "The Brilliance of Berckmans" is set for release in 2025 and hopefully will be for sale at Convention.

In the afternoon two breakout sessions will be offered. The first session will feature Vera Stewart, a nationally recognized TV personality, two-time cookbook author, and entrepreneur whose career in the food and hospitality industries spans four decades. Vera graduated from the University of Georgia with a degree in Home Economics Education in 1974. Launching her career in the 1980's, she has become a household name with ventures that included a bakery and café, and a national mail order business for her signature cakes and casseroles. She currently has the syndicated "The VeryVera Show" in its 13th season, the "VeryVera Cooking Camp" which has completed its 21st year, and "VERA," a multiscoped hospitality service for patrons of the Masters tournament. With a passion for Southern dishes passed down through generations, her manifold business endeavors have inspired people all over the nation to create memories in the kitchen. Vera's philosophy is based on a winning attitude and passion for perfection. Vera will have her two cookbooks for sale.

Immediately following Vera, the second session will feature Glen and Gail Hendry. Glen serves on the board of directors for the South Carolina Bluebird Society (SCBS), is a life-time member since 2010, and heads up the Trails Committee. Glen and Gail monitor the Hitchcock Woods Trails in Aiken, SC which consists of 86 bluebird nest boxes and 12 screech owl boxes. Glen does the statistical reporting for the SCBS, including supplying the data to the Cornell Nest Watch program. Glen received a B.S. in Geology in 1976 from The Pennsylvania State University. He met his wife in an underground uranium mine in New Mexico where Gail was a miner (drilling, pacing dynamite, and blasting the rocks). Gail received her RN from Augusta College in 1994. Both are retired now (but working harder than ever!!)

The speaker at the Awards Banquet is Owen Navaree. Owen graduated from Augusta University with a bachelor's degree in biology. He started his botanical career at the Augusta National nursery pruning their famous azalea bushes in the summer of 2021. He began working at Phinizy Center for Water Sciences in May of 2023 as a researcher working to study and restore the Rocky Spider Shoal Lilies in the Savannah River. He got his passion for wildlife from hunting and fishing in the Augusta area with his family

Wednesday's luncheon speaker is Mark Albertin. Mark was born in Waukesha, Wisconsin. He moved south to Georgia in 1986 and has loved his transplanted home as if it were his birthplace. Mark has had a camera around his neck since he was a teenager, eventually starting his own darkroom. He has an associate's degree in printing and publishing and since 1999 had focused on documentary films, many of which have aired on PBS or screened at filmed at film festivals across the country. His first book, containing photographs around Georgia and South Carolina called, "Along the Fall Line" was released in January 2024. He will be speaking on the Okefenokee Wildlife Refuge which is the topic of his 2nd book due out in April-May 2025



The club also hosts a spring plant sale to fund the club and receive new members.



U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service Finalizes Plan for a Minor Expansion of the Okefenokee National Wildlife Refuge Boundary



The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service today announced, January 3, 2025, its final decision to expand the acquisition boundary of the Okefenokee National Wildlife Refuge by approximately 22,000 acres. The new acquisition boundary includes lands currently held by a variety of owners within a 1-mile fuel reduction zone adjacent to the refuge. Potential conservation actions on the lands within the boundary expansion could strengthen protection of the hydrological integrity of the swamp, provide habitat for the gopher tortoise, mitigate impacts of wildfires, and provide opportunities for longleaf pine restoration to benefit the red-cockaded woodpecker.

The expanded boundary allows the Service to potentially offer priority public uses such as hunting, fishing, wildlife watching, and education to the more than 400,000 annual visitors to the refuge, thereby driving a growing ecotourism economy within the community.

Today's decision follows the Department's <u>recent announcement</u> that Okefenokee National Wildlife Refuge will be nominated to the UNESCO World Heritage List. If designated, the refuge would join the list recognizing 1,223 cultural and natural sites of universal importance, such as the Grand Canyon in Arizona, the Taj Mahal in India, the Great Wall in China, and the Galápagos Islands in Ecuador.

During a 55-day public scoping period, which included an in-person public meeting and a virtual meeting, the public submitted approximately 30,000 comments including individuals from 36 countries and all 50 states, including Washington D.C., Virgin Islands, and Puerto Rico. Comments, which were generally supportive of the proposal, represented the views of approximately 40 non-governmental organizations, one Tribal Nation, seven government officials, and the general public.

Minor boundary modifications were made to correct mapping errors and to ensure the proposed area was acceptable to all landowners in the area. The minor boundary expansion enables the Service to work with willing landowners to explore voluntary conservation actions, including potential acquisition or conservation easements, that would further protect the refuge's globally significant freshwater wetland system and wildlife habitat.

The response received during the public comment period is a testament to just how special Okefenokee is, not just to our local community, but to people all over the nation and around the world," said Michael Lusk, refuge manager at Okefenokee National Wildlife Refuge. "We appreciate the commitment to conserving this landscape. This minor expansion will help further conservation efforts for the swamp along with the threatened and endangered species that inhabit it."

The Okefenokee National Wildlife Refuge, located in Folkston, Georgia, is the headwaters of the Suwannee and St. Mary's rivers. The refuge provides habitat for fish and wildlife, including threatened and endangered species. It is world renowned for its amphibian populations, which are bio-indicators of global health. The refuge has 353,981 acres of National Wilderness Area within the refuge boundaries. Additionally, it is a Wetland of International Importance

(RAMSAR Convention – 1971) due to the Okefenokee Swamp's global significance. The refuge receives approximately 400,000 annual visits, with 10 percent of those visits from international guests from more than 46 different countries. The Okefenokee National Wildlife Refuge also helps support an average of \$39.2 million on recreation spent annually, which includes supporting 826 jobs associated with that recreation and \$17.5 million in job-related income.
