

# PRESERVING THE HISTORY OF CUPID FALLS

"It is a great place to go for a quiet walk and enjoy the solitude." Trip Advistor

The little city of Young Harris lies at the foot of Georgia's highest peak in Brasstown Valley, an area within the Chattahoochee-Oconee National Forest. The area is often referred to as enchanting for many reasons, but probably first and foremost is our Cupid Falls.

Cupid Falls is a 13-acre park with trails, a boardwalk, two pavilions, restrooms, a rain garden, and a beautiful waterfall. The waterfall is 10 to 15 feet high, and the trails could take 10 to 20 minutes to walk. Most of the trails are easy and level. If needed, you can also view the Falls from the car.

Following the Cherokee land lottery in 1832, the white settlers poured into the area to mine for gold and farm the available land. One pioneer settler was John Bryson (1800-1874), who acquired sizeable holdings in Brasstown Valley. It was he, no doubt, who built the first grist mill in the community to grind the corn into cornmeal. Later, in 1892, after the college's founding, J. D. Cooley, a miller, moved to the area. He constructed the cement dam at the top of the falls and built a flume to route the water to the mill, a good distance away

Around the 1930s, with the availability of commercial milling products in grocery stores, the Mill operations ended, and the Mill was torn down around 1950.

For nearly two centuries, Cupid Falls and Corn Creek have been a family and kid-friendly recreation area. Remembering earlier times before modern technology of televisions, cell phones, and the internet, residents fondly remember the Cupid Falls area as their neighborhood playground.

As for the Young Harris College students, it is a beautiful setting for "Cupiding", the appeal of seclusion and natural surroundings. It is unknown how Cupid Falls got its name, but it seems appropriate that it started with the Young Harris College students.

The Enotah Garden Club takes great pride in supporting the City of Young Harris by helping maintain the Cupid Falls recreation area. The Enotah Garden Club actively promoted the concept of and in 2024, sponsored the installation of a new bridge to connect the trails. 

When parking at the first lot on the left, turn left towards picnic tables to take the short walk to the falls. View the signage on the way to learn the history of the Corn Creek Preserve and how to create a rain garden. This is an easy walk that is great for kids. Leashed Pet friendly.

#### **GARDEN THERAPY**

Mountain View is in the process of finishing up the Easter bags for Rebecca Blaylock Child Development Center. This spring, we continue our education about pollinators and "good bugs" for these youngsters by

focusing on ladybugs. Each child will receive a stuffed ladybug, honeybee, or caterpillar, a pair of spring socks, a container of Play Dough, a softball

size inflatable ladybug ball, a ladybug Easter egg with a Peppermint Patty, and the older The children will get a craft kit to make a paper ladybug to hang in their room at home. In addition, the club has purchased several books about ladybugs, fiction and nonfiction, for teachers to share information with students, and a fun Ladybug coloring book with enough pictures for all the students to get one to color. ## BONSAI EXPERT INTRODUCES HIS ART TO NCHS GREENHOUSE GANG





Henry Wu, MD presented a PowerPoint on the practice of bonsai, including styles, species, and care. He also brought several bonsai trees from his collection to show the NCHS Greenhouse Gang various species and styles. He presented a workshop showing student gardeners how to put cuttings in pots with bonsai soil and gave them instructions on watering. Every student got to take home their own bonsai tree.

Dr. Wu first started keeping bonsai as a medical student in Boston, when he brought home a Serissa bonsai he got from a vendor at flower show. After a few unsuccessful attempts to keep his bonsai alive indoors, he gave up Bonsai for several years until he came to Atlanta, where the local bonsai community revived his interest. He now keeps over 100 trees, and studies with bonsai master Kenji Miyata in McDonough Georgia. Bonsai keeping runs deep in Henry's family, as his great-grandfather had a large collection in Taiwan. In his day job, Dr. Wu is an Associate Professor of Medicine and Distinguished Physician in the Division of Infectious Diseases at Emory University. He also serves as the director of the Emory TravelWell Center, Emory's center dedicated to the prevention, treatment, and surveillance of infections related to travel and migration.

#### STUDENTS WITH SPECIAL NEEDS SUPPORTS GREENHOUSE INITIATIVES

Many hands make light work is how the saying goes, and it takes many hands to manage the huge production of the North Cobb High School Mother's Day Plant Sale and the many initiatives of the NC Warrior's Greenhouse Gang. This is why they benefit from the partnership of their Special Needs classes, especially the school's two Transition Program classes. A Transition Program is an opportunity for students with special needs to gain additional independence training and work/job-related skills. It is designed for students ages 18-21.

"With the limitations of our greenhouse and the need for constant plant attention this time of year, we gain valuable support from our students with disabilities, "says Sue Aughey, Greenhouse Gang sponsor. "They are our lifeline," While general education students are taking rigorous classes, our Transition students are learning life and employment skills. They keep our greenhouse clean, set up stations for planting, water plants as needed, weed and help sell. It is a great collaboration.


