The Magnolia District theme for 2025-2027 is “Healthier Environment, Healthier You with Beautification, Conservation, and Education”. This theme amplifies the relationship we have with the world around us and our responsibility as stewards of the natural beauty, wildlife, clean water, and clean air.

With this theme we have chosen goals to reflect those responsibilities. Keep these goals in mind as you plan your 2025-2027 club calendar.

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DIRECTORS CORNER continues:

Goal 1: Magnolia District Clubs will educate members and their community about the importance of pollinators. Clubs will plant native plants that feed, host and support bees, butterflies, and birds in our district.

Goal 2: Magnolia District Clubs and club members will become familiar with the negative impact of plastic on our air, water, and soil. Club members will identify ways to reduce utilizing single use plastics and implement strategies to reduce dependence on single use plastic at home, at meetings, and in the community.

Goal 3: Magnolia District Clubs will celebrate the United States of America's 250th anniversary (2026) by planting red, white, and blue gardens at their homes and in their communities.

All 23 clubs, the Sumter Federation, and Columbus Council have registered for the coming year. Plans are well underway for the joint Camellia and Magnolia Districts Leadership and Awards Workshop to be held June 16 in Cordele. See the calendar for dates and places for summer district board meeting in August and annual district meeting October 8th.

In 2026, the Magnolia District will host the Garden Club of Georgia Convention. Kay Hagler is our convention chair and is working on details. Additionally, we will be celebrating the 250th anniversary of the United States of America. Groundwork is already underway for the 100th anniversary of the Garden Club of Georgia in 2028.

On Saturday, April 5, 2025, a meaningful and solemn ceremony sponsored by the Columbus Council of Garden Clubs in cooperation with the Georgia Department of
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Transportation and the Garden Club of Georgia took place at the Georgia Visitor Information and Welcome Center in Columbus. The National Garden Clubs of America Gold Star Memorial Marker was placed and dedicated in honor of the families whose loved one paid the ultimate sacrifice in service to our country.

The Gold Star Memorial, a symbol of honor, remembrance, and gratitude, will stand as a lasting tribute to those who gave their lives in defense of freedom. The memorial is part of the nationwide Gold Star Memorial Trail Project, which aims to remind communities across the United States of the high cost of freedom and the duty of every American to honor those who have served.

America's Gold Star Families is a 501(c) (3) not for profit organization created to provide support to those who have lost a loved one in service to our country through the United States Armed Forces, representing all conflicts, all branches of service, and all circumstances of death while serving. The organization's mission is to offer honor, hope, and healing while providing an atmosphere of emotional and psychological support.

The Marker was presented to Lativia Rivers, Georgia Visitor Information, and Jim Clute, Georgia Department of Transportation, with our appreciation for their support and approval for the placement of the marker. Guest speaker, Mayor Skip Henderson graciously acknowledged the placement of the marker, the first Gold Star Marker in the area, as a lasting memorial to honor our nation's heroes and to know that the residents of Columbus are grateful and proud of our citizens who defended our freedom and appreciate the families who made the sacrifices as well. Love & Environmental Impact for Gardeners

In February, we embraced the spirit of Valentine’s Day—celebrating friendship with festive red and pink attire and meaningful activities. One highlight was our environmental shoe recycling program, which aimed to reduce landfill waste and support those in need. Members donated gently worn shoes, giving them a second life while making a positive impact on both people and the planet.

As love bloomed, so did our attention to wildlife. Mid-month was the perfect time to clean and install nest boxes for the upcoming bluebird breeding season. This annual activity continues to offer a rewarding experience for members of all ages. Rounding out the month, some of our garden members took part in an educational field trip hosted by Fort Benning’s Natural Resources Management Branch (NRMB) which actively manages Fort Benning’s natural resources to ensure environmental sustainability and mission readiness—both now and in the future. Their approach is grounded in field inventory and monitoring, scientific research, and adaptive management. Key tools and techniques include prescribed fire, harvesting/thinning and reforestation, invasive species control, threatened and endangered species surveys, and the regulation of game through hunting and fishing programs.

The program deepened our understanding of local conservation practices and highlighted the critical role of ecosystem-based land management. It was an eye-opening experience that underscored the importance of land stewardship and the science of maintaining healthy, resilient ecosystems right in our own backyard.

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All Things Green: A St Patrick's Day Celebration

As the calendar turned to March, Azalea Garden Club members were greeted with a festive burst of green—thanks to our very own Azalea leprechaun, shamrocks, and plenty of Irish cheer! Our St. Patrick's Day celebration was filled with laughter, camaraderie, and a healthy dose of garden-themed fun.

The highlight of the meeting was a special presentation from Chattahoochee Riverkeeper, a vital organization dedicated to protecting and preserving Columbus' water resources. Members learned about the important work being done to monitor the health of the Chattahoochee River and surrounding waterways. Through efforts such as identifying and halting illegal pollution, advocating for native plant restoration, and removing invasive species, our riverkeeper is helping to keep our environment cleaner and healthier for future generations.

In addition to the environmental focus, several of our members either attended or participated in the Chattahoochee Valley Camellia Show—a true celebration of the “rose of winter.” The show was a wonderful opportunity to promote, educate, and admire the stunning beauty of camellias in all their forms. With blooms on display ranging from delicate whites to vibrant pinks and reds, it was an inspiring treat for flower lovers of all kinds.
