

The Recycling-Paper Making Project

The Brooklet Garden Club Youth committee decided as a recycle and Earth Day project for 2025 the Brooklet Youth Jacket Garden Club fifth graders at Brooklet Elementary would make paper. This project was fun and involved the Pre-K and printing technician, both who saved leftover and used paper. The Brooklet Garden Club hosted the Bulloch Council of Garden Clubs joint luncheon this year, and the fifth grade classes made the paper into bookmarks which were used as favors for the luncheon.

The Brooklet Garden Club Youth committee members demonstrated the process of paper making-the tearing or shredding, making pulp in the blender, draining the pulp on a screen, and using a sponge, couch paper, and block to finish the process. The children worked in pairs of twos, five pairs at a time to create their own paper. As the groups rotated, Mr. Petkewich the STEM teacher, presented a recycling slide program and demonstrated how reducing plastics makes a big difference in the landfills.

The students enjoyed the project and seeing the dried paper they created. The paper was cut into book marks and decorated using markers and adding ribbon. Each student made a bookmark for a council garden club member and one for themself. They were beautiful! The ladies at the luncheon thought so too!












Garden Club of Pooler


Parkersburg Garden Council

Summer is upon us and many of our club activities slow to a crawl during the summer break. Because of this I have extended the summer publication deadline into the month of August. June Thomas, Oleander Facebook Editor, Kathy Shields, Oleander Website Coordinator, and I will at times share your club's submissions on all three social outlets. The **Oleander Leaflet** quidelines are as follows:

Spring Publication: Due April 1 - Publish April 30

Summer Publication: Due August 15- Publish August 31

Fall Publication: Due Oct. 1 - Publish October 31

Winter Publication: Due Dec. 1 - Publish December 31

Publishing dates may vary due to quantity of information received.

Spring is on its way out and Summer is scheduled to arrive on June 20th. The Farmer's Almanac is predicting "a scorcher of a summer." And while our temperatures have been somewhat unusual over the past few days with cool morning temps, we in southeast Georgia know it is only a matter of time before the humidity and sticky, hot summer days will soon be upon us. Remember to hydrate those plants, especially the container varieties. It isn't unusual to have to water twice a day in the heat of the summer. Check closely for powdery mildew and those nasty little aphids which seem to arrive with the frequent afternoon rain showers. A great remedy for the powdery mildew is to mix I tablespoon of baking soda, and I teaspoon of liquid dish soap into I gallon of water. Pour into a spray bottle and shake well. Spray liberally onto all affected areas. As for the aphids, Neem oil can be an effective organic solution for controlling them.

Enjoy your time in the gardens everyone and have a wonderful summer holiday.
