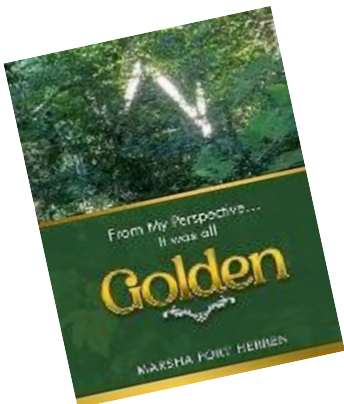
## Herb Farm Founder Marsha Herren Speaks to Club

Marsha Herren spoke to the Milledgeville Garden Club: "The Historical Perspective of Herbs: A Medicinal and Flavorful Journey." Marsha Herren and her husband Darryl officially licensed Olive Forge Herb Farm in the mid 1980s, the first and only licensed herb farm in Georgia for the next 34 years. The farm sat on 15 acres on Brown's Crossing Road in Milledgeville. After her husband's death, Ms. Herren was not physically able to manage the farm alone. She keeps the Facebook page Olive Forge Herb Farm going with recipes, ideas about growing and new facts about herbs. She has spent these years since 2017 painting and writing while continuing to research old diseases and plant based medicines used by our ancestors. Ms. Herren spoke to the Milledgeville Garden Club in October 2025 sharing with the membership her love of herbs. She shared medicinal uses for

peppermint and rosemary. She brought along her artwork and published books to share with the club. She has been instrumental in assisting the club with the refurbishment of the historical Brown-Stetson-Sanford House's herb garden undertaken in 2024. The membership awarded Ms. Herren with a MGC Subscription Membership and made a donation to the MGC Scholarship Fund in her name.

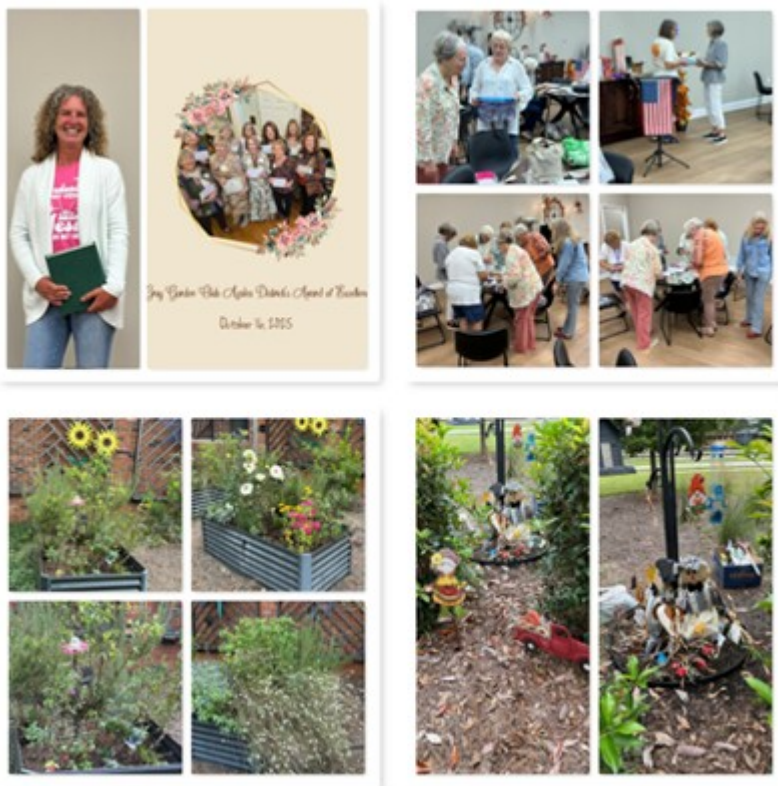


# Gray Garden Club

## Did You Know Athens Has a Moon Tree?

Athens is home to one of the incredible moon trees. You might be wondering — what exactly is a moon tree?

At our November meeting, guest speaker Melanie Ford shared this fascinating arboreal tale. She recounted the remarkable journey of seeds that traveled to the moon aboard the Apollo 14 mission in 1971. Upon their return, these seeds were planted across the United

States in honor of America's bicentennial, nearly 50 years ago. Today, they stand as living monuments to exploration and history. Athens' tree is one of only 110 or so that have been located in the U.S. Melanie's master's thesis documents the story in detail, from astronaut Stuart Roosa, who carried the seeds into lunar orbit, to the U.S. Forest Service, which helped nurture them. Thanks to their efforts, Athens proudly hosts its own moon tree: a humble yet historic loblolly pine (*Pinus taeda*)\*\*. You can find it standing tall in the parking lot of the city's old library, now home to the Planning and

tree, and the 3 or so others in Georgia. Her passion and scholarship brought this hidden piece of Athens' history to life, and we were thrilled to learn about such a unique connection between our city and the story of space exploration.

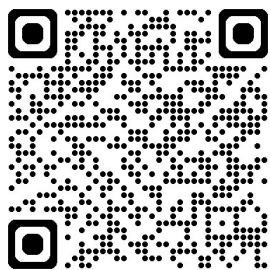
That evening there will be a district photo gathering, a cash

## Milkweed for Monarchs: You can help support monarch butterflies

### From State Botanical Garden

Bright orange and black wings flutter by on the journey that defies all odds. Monarch butterflies born in the fall must fly about 3,000 miles to reach their overwintering ground in Mexico. These native insects are under threat from many different hazards, and their numbers are declining. One of the best ways we can support monarchs, and other native insects, is by providing them with appropriate food sources.

Conservationists at the State Botanical Garden of Georgia at the University of Georgia stress the im-

portance of planting native species in your home garden to support native wildlife, such as the monarch butterfly.

"Adult monarch butterflies need native, nectar-producing powerhouse plants, especially during their spring and fall migrations. They can be sourced from a variety of genera, including but not limited to Phlox, Symphyotrichum (Aster), Rudbeckia, Penstemon, Monarda and many others.

One of the best species for monarchs, as well as many other pollinators, is *Pycnanthemum* or mountain mint. Native pollinators love

mountain mint, and with over 20 species native to Georgia, *Pycnanthemum* can be a staple in any native pollinator garden, according to Jennifer Ceska, the garden's conservation coordinator.

Monarch caterpillars are special in that they require a specific host plant, milkweed or *Asclepias*.

The milkweeds you select should be native and ecoregion appropriate. If you can plant just two *Asclepias* species, researchers recommend *Asclepias incarnata*, swamp milkweed, and *Asclepias tuberosa*, butterfly milkweed.

# Hurricane Helene, Compost, and God's Vine

*One of the most rewarding benefits of gardening is discovering that, sometimes, we are not the only gardener in our landscape. Despite our best efforts to control our space, sometimes, forces beyond our control have other plans. Here is a sweet tale of one gardener's experience after Hurricane Helene.*

In September of 2024, Hurricane Helene ravaged her way inland all the way to the Georgia/South Carolina border, forever changing our landscape and our lives. My husband Henry and I were among the lucky ones. Several residents of the North Augusta /Augusta area were crushed in their beds.

Assured that the brunt of the storm was headed toward the other side of Atlanta and would miss us, we slept soundly within our seven-acre homestead. We awakened to utter devastation.

Miraculously, our house was not harmed; however the four acres immediately surrounding us suffered massive damage. Our chickens were all killed, our koi pond crushed. Huge oaks, pines and elms were uprooted. Our two-acre woodland garden, orchard, well, and barn were all destroyed.

For the next six weeks, all we could do was basic clearing of our grand trees, grateful to be spared our home and our lives. Each day we did whatever we could to focus forward, determined to rebuild our beautiful gardens. We told ourselves the goal was to just accomplish SOMETHING!

Then something rather amazing happened at the rear of our property.

One day, I noticed some vines growing out of the one remaining compost bin. The vines grew quickly, then started to bloom. Something must have sprouted from previously discarded vegetable scraps and was now growing vigorously. In a short time, the vine covered the space of two Volkswagens.

My plant identification app told me this was butternut squash and sure enough, flowers quickly turned into fruit. By mid-July, harvesting began.

Please understand that not only did I not plant this, but I never even watered it! I couldn't. Our well was destroyed. Throughout spring and summer, as we continued our reconstruction, this volunteer squash vine continued to grow all on its own.

As of Sept 5, I have now harvested 153 butternut squash!

About 100 squash ago, Henry and I realized that this was

simply not normal. I think God decided that these two gardeners needed something to smile about and hope for.

I believe that this is a divine act of mercy from God who decided we had had enough grief and gifted us some joy.

The harvest still continues, new blooms appear every day, and we continue to share our bounty with our community.

Dozens have been distributed through our local food pantry, our favorite pizza restaurant, our pharmacist, and our priest. We continue to share these gifts gladly and are forever grateful for this opportunity to tend what we have named God's vine.
