Ikebana means *living flowers*. The Japanese art of flower arranging has been described at once more subtle, more sensitive, and more sophisticated than the methods of arranging flowers usually employed in other cultures. This is so because Ikebana is an art in Japan in the same sense that painting and sculpture are arts elsewhere.

Ikebana is a visual art that uses plant materials that come in a wide variety of forms. Depending on the materials, artistic judgment must be used to readjust the established forms. There are five main Ikebana types: Rikka, Shoka, Jiyuka, Nageirebana, and Moribana, however, different websites name others, referring to style and patterns.

A few Winter Garden Suggestions...

~ Take a look around those garden tools. Anything broken, overly rusty, in need of a good clean? Something still in its package, unused after years? Replace/clean what is needed, donate the others!

~ Ever find yourself looking for a specific tool? Or any tool at all? Racking your brain to remember where it is? Now is a great time to plan out/build/buy a tool organizer for the garage and/or basement!

~ How's the outdoor garden look? You know, the one that looks amazing come mid-summer, but kinda' heavily overgrown and in need of... something? You know it has the potential to be more? But what? Maybe a hard trim or deep edging... added support or a decorative addition? Most outdoor plant debris trimmed now may be placed back on top as mulch, adding nutrition to that area. Do not ever use diseased looking leaves or plants as mulch; throw them in a bag and then into the garbage!

~ Ever thought about starting plants indoors? Well, now's the time! There are an abundant of vegetables that may easily be started indoors now (no greenhouse required)! This can bring vegetables to the yard sooner, and the potential to last longer through the season! A few good ones may include tomatoes, bell/hot/sweet peppers, eggplant, onions, celery, broccoli, and so many others!

The Garden Club of Georgia, Inc. Student Scholarships Grant Awards 2025


GCG provided \$90,000.00 in grants to 15 students for the 2025-2026 academic term and are thankful to all who have contributed to the GCG Scholarship Program.

Hydroponics: For those of us 'new to gardening...' Simply put, Gardening indoors without soil!

There are six types of Hydroponic Growth Systems that include: Deep Water Culture (DWC), Nutrient Film Technique (NFT), Ebb & Flow (Flood & Drain), Drip Systems, Aeroponics, and Wick System.

Now... how might I know this? Because I am a member of the NWGC and one of our newest members, Nancy McDowell, grows plants and vegetables using Hydroponic gardening, and was kind enough to share a phenomenal presentation on it for us last month! She went over the benefits (faster growth, higher yields, year-round gardening, to name a few): the different uses (year-round indoor gardening or for transplanting outdoors or a mix of both): pre-seeded pods, grow anything pods, and seed starting: as well as lighting, water tips, pollination, nutrients, and more!

One thing Nancy did say that can make a difference for the seasoned gardener, are seeds. She mentioned that some seeds may be better 'tasting' if they are heirloom varieties, and recommended we look into Southern Exposure Seed Exchange as well as Territorial Seeds.
